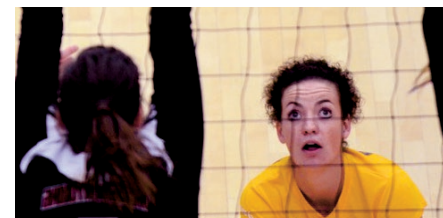

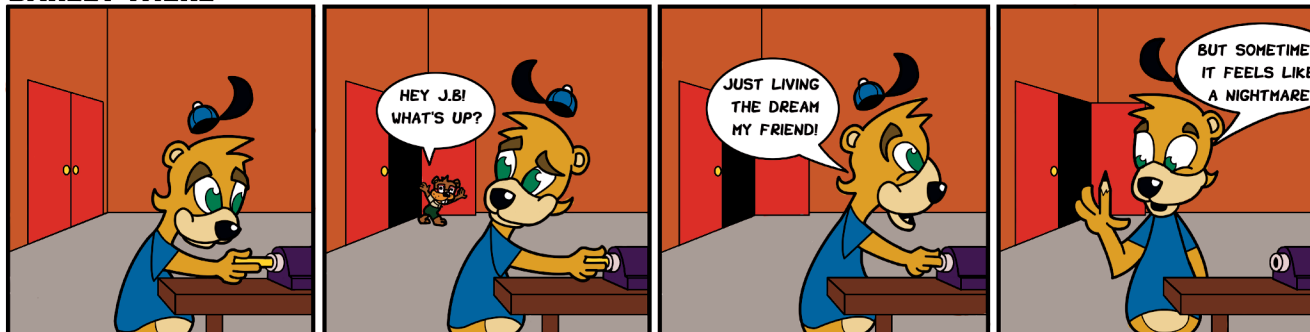
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Welcome and congratulations **new SLCC President** Huftalin

On Thursday, Sept. 11, Utah Board of Regents unanimously voted Deneece Huftalin the new president of Salt Lake Community College.

The vote took place in the Oak Room at the Taylorsville Redwood campus, which was filled with SLCC staff, faculty, Deans, students, and student leaders.

After everyone was settled, the head of the Utah Board of Regents, Daniel W. Campbell, introduced those involved with the search committee and gave a brief overview of how

the previous President, Cynthia Bioteau, resigned to accept a job as President of Florida State College.

France A. Davis, Chair of the Search Committee, then nominated Deneece Huftalin for President of the College.

Jesslie B. Anderson then seconded this, upon which Campbell asked for those in favor and was met with a roomful of "ayes," making the decision unanimous.

"I am thrilled and honored to continue leading Salt Lake Community College," said Huftalin. "I am eager to resume working with the trustees, faculty, administration, staff and students, and to continue our efforts to make SLCC a premier comprehensive community

college."

Huftalin began her work at SLCC as the Director of Academic and Career Advising in 1992. After two years she was named Dean of Students. In 2004, she accepted the role of Vice President of Student Services and took on the role of Interim President when the former President left.

Huftalin plans to continue to work hard to improve student outcomes and meet the diverse student body needs.

"I will do my best to ensure that Salt Lake Community College remains an inclusive, student-centered institution where individuals from diverse backgrounds can receive a high-quality, affordable education," Huftalin said.

Your voice, your opinions, your radio. Welcome to Radio SLCC, a by-student for-student radio station streaming from South City Campus.

Radio SLCC features student produced variety shows, news updates, live campus plugs, and sporting events. Salt Lake Community College offers two classes that provide hands-on learning techniques in our state-of-the-art facility. Only on Radio SLCC will you find shows ranging from European soccer discussions to Jamaican hip hop artists.

COMM 1560 provides instruction and experience in the production of audio programs for radio, including history, career opportunities, issues and techniques of radio and announcing. The class culminates with students producing their own hour-long radio show. COMM 2560, the more advanced class, builds on the skills attained in 1560, but grants students a two-hour show on the topic of their choice.

Only COMM 1560 and COMM 2560 enrollees are provided access to the studio. There are, however, some opportunities for non-radio students to get on air. One could corroborate with their favorite DJ to schedule a time for on-air appearances. For now, things are quiet on Radio SLCC but as the term picks up speed, new shows will be airing regularly.

Scot Singpiel, the COMM 1560 instructor, has spent over 25 years in radio and was formerly the Radio SLCC Station Manager. About five years ago, Scot restructured the curriculum of his 1560 class.

"The class is designed to teach being a better communicator," says Singpiel. The result: an average class size increasing from five to 25. He acknowledges the emphasis on radio, but is adamant on the necessity of being a better communicator on-air and in life. By midterm, over 20 students will be kicking-off their own radio shows.

"People talk about what their passionate about and it's always exciting to see how they differ," concluded Singpiel.

Damien Holmes, a COMM 1560 student, is working on his new broadcast called *The Certified Underground Uncensored Show*. The show delves into underground and unfamiliar music heard throughout the world. He feels that any student looking to get into radio should, "conquer any fear of being shy. It's not live. Follow your favorite DJ and try to emulate them."

While the ship has sailed to register for COMM 1560 and 2560, students can still enjoy the unique opinions of our SLCC DJ's. Live streaming is always available on radioslcc.com. Where there is Internet, there is the voice of Salt Lake Community College.

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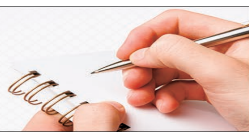
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'Fine tune' your **music** passion

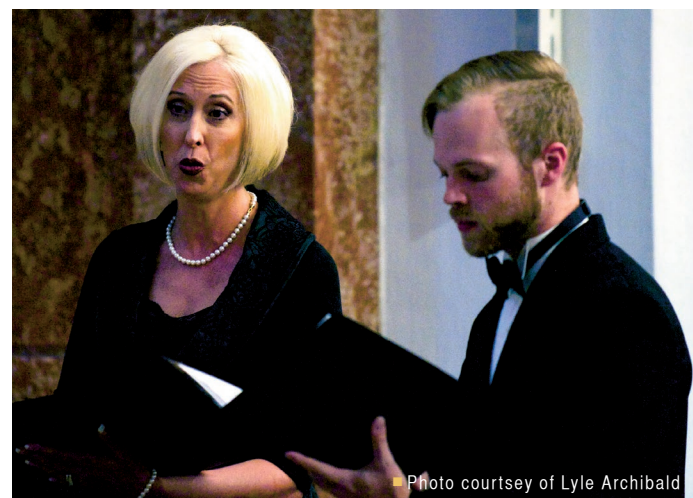
