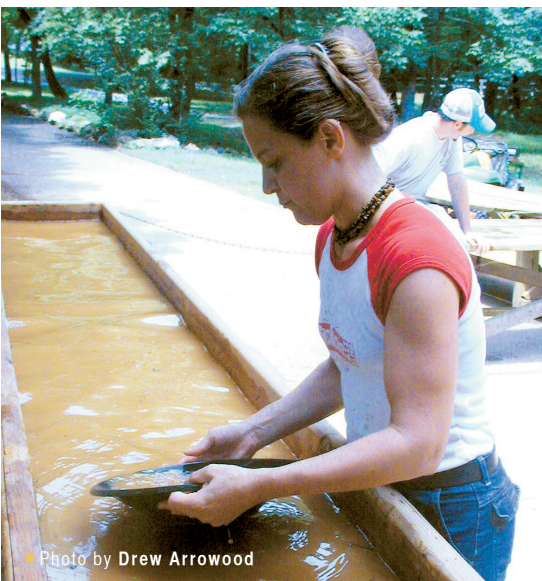

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SLCC to transition from college to university status

Salt Lake Community College announced a major change for the 2015-2016 school year. SLCC will be redubbing itself Salt Lake University in order to lend credibility to the school and to justify recent tuition increases.

By going from a community college to a university status, SLCC hopes to better compete with other universities in Utah, including the University of Utah, Weber State University, Dixie State University, Utah Valley University and Utah State University.

"This decision was done after very careful consideration and collaboration between staff and the board of trustees of the college," says vice chairman of the college, Fred Regent.

Teachers believe that by redubbing the school Salt Lake University it will motivate students to work harder in classes and also help to increase

attendance. Teachers also hope it will help current students understand why tuition has increased over the past few semesters.

Students had both positive and negative reactions to the announced change. Jake Jones, who is a second semester freshman working towards his associate degree, responded by saying, "I think the name change is a great idea. I hope now that SLCC is going to be a University that they'll offer more four year degrees like the U."

Albert Alvarez, who is graduating this spring, thinks that the name change is a poor excuse for tuition hikes, "It's not like the quality of the education is going to increase with the name change. It seems like a good smoke and mirrors distraction to distract students from tuition increases."

Regardless of student and faculty opinion, the name change is happening - just like tuition increases. The schools website has a feedback form regarding the name change, with a disclaimer at the bottom. "Feel free to have your voice heard, however, change is coming regardless on April 1."

A new rule change at Salt Lake Community College will take place the first day of April, making parking available next semester for all students free of charge. Students will no longer have to purchase parking stickers at any of the 10 campus locations.

The new rule change was decided after SLCC received additional funding from the state legislature, and decided they didn't need additional funding by charging students for parking passes.

"I think it's great. It's been such a hassle purchasing a daily parking pass because I switch cars a lot. I barely have the time to find a parking spot before I'm late to my online class," says student Ammon Fisher.

One board member suggested that the former parking patrol could be reassigned to hall monitors; serving infractions to students who get caught littering, loitering, or wandering the halls without permission.

Menu change may put end to SLCC meat controversy

Head cook at the Salt Lake Community College's dining services, Diane Miller, announced earlier this week that all of their dishes containing meat will now exclusively contain in-vitro meat.

This change is made to appease the increasing amount of environmentally concerned students, as well as animal rights activists, pressuring Miller and her team to remove factory farm produced meat.

"I consider this a huge success. I've been writing letters to Diane since last semester and a couple of my friends and I have tried to protest the lack of plant-based options," says SLCC student Maggie LaPaugh.

LaPaugh, has been vegetarian for eight years and was one of the key movers for the menu change.

"We now have means to please every student on campus," Miller says. "We have been getting feedback from several vegetarian students asking for more cruelty-free options and now we have cruelty-free meat. Meat eaters will hardly notice the

difference in taste and texture."

In-vitro meat, which is also called cultured, test-tube, or victimless meat – is an animal-flesh product that is produced through the replication of a single fetal calf serum. Once those fetal cells are extracted the need for the resources to produce meat are no longer necessary in the amount they once were.

"I don't even really like the taste of vegetables, but now that victimless meat is an option, I might let myself be a test-tube-atarian," says LaPaugh.

Max Jeraldo is an 18-year-old SLCC sophomore and has always been passionate about the environment. It is a passion that often conflicts with his primal love for a juicy burger and his unrelenting craving for steak.

"Now that I can get meat at the food court that doesn't require as much water or that generates as much pollution [as factory farmed meat] my vegetarian environmental friends will finally get off my back. I don't have to feel guilty for eating food I like. I can affordably eat meat and be sustainable," says Jeraldo.

This is very exciting for all students at SLCC and begins this April Fools Day on all campus.

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Talorsville cemetery canal ranked #1 cheap date location

at the canal, the ducks were not as pleased. During the celebration one of the couples decided to bring croutons instead of breadcrumbs. Once word got out that bread could have flavor the ducks became outraged by this discovery.

"All these years we have been fed breadcrumbs time and time again. We didn't know bread could actually have flavor. We have been getting short-changed for years," says Brant Duck, a local canal resident.

The ducks decided to begin a non-violent protest against people using breadcrumbs instead of croutons. The ducks first began by refusing to eat the bread thrown to them. Local duck feeding residents did not notice any difference in the ducks behavior thinking the ducks were not that hungry.

Fearing that their silent protest wasn't working, local Taylorsville ducks began organizing their forces to picket outside the student center at Salt Lake Community College's Taylorsville Redwood Campus.

"It's about time we bring the humans to justice and inform them of their cruelty in giving us nothing but flavorless bread from the beginning of

our settlement in Taylorsville," says Ruddy Duck, a local crouton activist.

On March 20 at 11:30 a.m. flocks of ducks picketed outside the student center. While crossing Redwood Road, 13 ducks were injured by oncoming cars and two were killed.

"Our losses are great, but our message is greater," says duck croutons activist leader Mallard Luther King.

The ducks protested outside the student center for two hours. Unfortunately, no one from SLCC was actually present for the protest due to the school's spring break.

"We probably should have checked the school calendar," says protest coordinator Ross Duck. The ducks then returned to the canal that afternoon.

Officials are teaming with SLCC's cafeteria to make a deal with the local ducks to accept the leftover garlic breadsticks at the end of each day.

"We hope this will restore the peace to the Taylorsville's canal. We would really prefer to not have to clean up after the ducks again. No one should have to do that," says SLCC's spokesperson Donald Downy.
