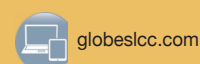

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Students benefit from new **rate reduction** for UTA transit pass

The OneCard is good for dozens of great things around Campus, but you may not know it's also good off-campus for UTA bus rides. Salt Lake Community College has recently lowered the price of UTA passes to \$15.00 for students. The B-Line is excellent for getting between campuses, but for students who need to use public transportation, the UTA student bus pass is a great way to go.

Starting this fall, students can get a regular 30-day pass for \$15.00, good on

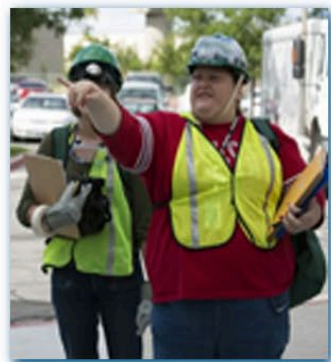

Trax and buses, or a Premium 30-day pass, which includes Fronrunner use for only \$36.00. For students who do not want to worry about having to purchase a pass every month can get a semester pass for \$57.00, or the premium for \$136.00.

"I think it's good that [bus passes] are cheaper. With tuition so high and having to pay rent, gas, and sometimes helping family out financially, it can be expensive," says SLCC student Manuel Bernal Adame.

To buy a UTA bus pass go to rideuta.com/studentpass, select SLCC, then enter your S-number and name. You will then be able to determine which pass suits your needs. After you enter your payment information you will need to take your OneCard to the information desk for activation.

One of the best parts of having a bus pass is that you never have to worry about finding parking on campus.

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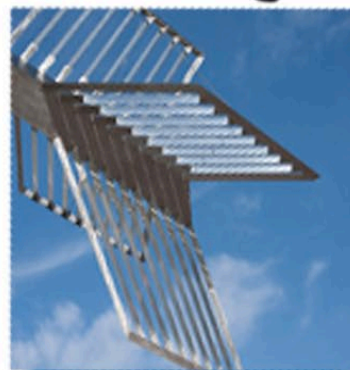

Veteran of historic WWII battle is **inspiration** for SLCC student

Salt Lake Community College student, Brad Bennion, recently gave The Globe a chance to tell the story of his grandfather, Doctor Don Weiler Bennion. Weiler was a man from another time. Born nearly a hundred years ago in Salt Lake City, he was a boy who split his years between schooling and the family ranch in Manilla. Weiler spent his long summer days herding sheep, riding horses, hunting, and fishing, and his family often heard him say it was the perfect place for a boy to grow up.

Before long, the looming shadow of the Second World War beckoned the servicemen and women of the United States, the attack on Pearl Harbor provided the impetus for Weiler to join the Air Force, then the newly-fledged Army Air Corps.

Unfortunately, Weiler was forced out of the Air Corps due to asthma, but made an excellent candidate for the United States Marines where Weiler was promoted to Captain in a short time.

Allied plans took him to Japan where he participated in the invasion of Iwo Jima in conjunction with D-Day on the European front. Weiler soon learned that war was an experience you would do well to forget. Six months later, the Japanese had surrendered and the war was over. Weiler parted from his troop, and to Brad's knowledge never saw them or the South Pacific again.

"My grandpa never really talked about the war, the only evidence we have is a single letter written to his family a month after the famous flag raising at Mount Suribachi," says Brad. "He witnessed it personally from the base of the mountain."

Weiler graduated first from the University of Utah then from a separate dental school. He opened a successful practice in Millcreek where he met his wife. Nearly

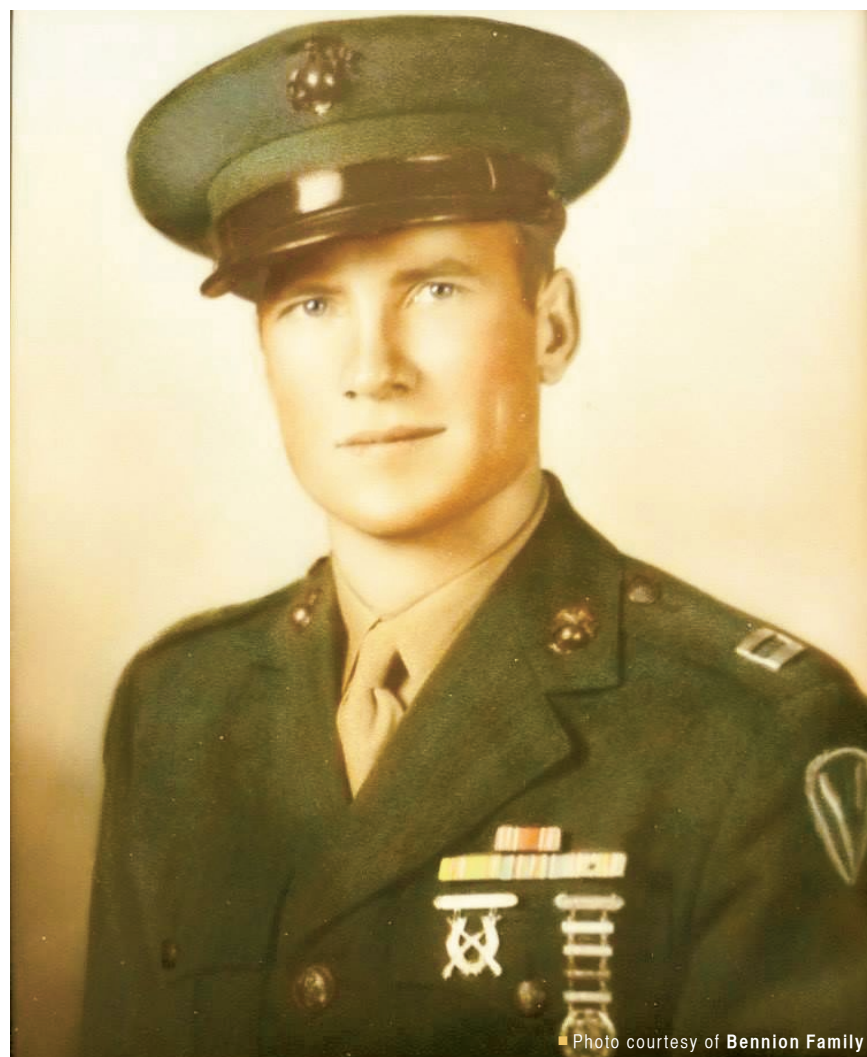

fifty years later during his retirement, Weiler spent his days volunteering at the Veterans Hospital and Salt Lake County Aging Department. He spent enough hours in the service of the community to be formally honored by Mayor Corroon in 2011.

Brad talks about when his grandfather was in public and saw fellow veterans in uniform, he would make a point to approach them and shake each of their hands.

Weiler believed he was a small part of a larger community and devoted part of his time as a dentist, providing free services for clients who couldn't pay. Furthermore, after Weiler was discharged, he voted in every local, state, and federal election that he could. He knew that however insignificant a vote may seem, it is not quite as insignificant after you've seen a foxhole full of dead men who fought to keep that right alive.

"My grandfather's service directly influenced my thinking about how we as individuals should fit into a community – that everyone has a way to give back," says Brad "It's helped me strive to be a better student, and to use my talents to better enrich those around me."

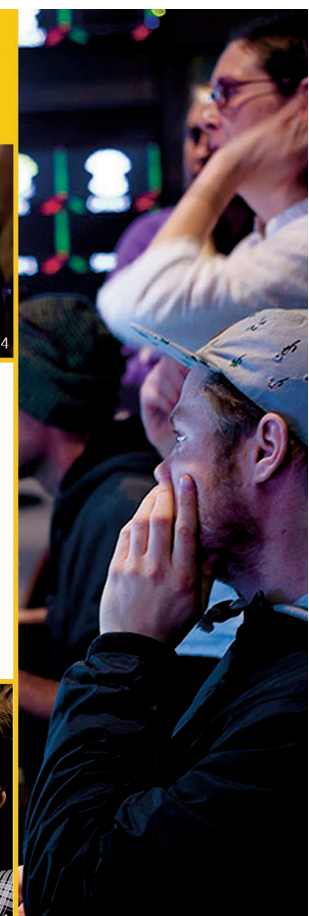
