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## Harsh reality for ambitious idea in the Center for Arts and Media

Imagine a room that allows instructors and students to go through lessons in a virtual reality setting, one step short of Tron. Salt Lake Community College has an area in the South City Campus that was intended to be such a room.

The purpose of the room would have provided an immersive environment in which instructors would be able to demonstrate "complex and complicated ideas represented through virtual reality" as Assistant Professor Tyler Smith explains.

Simply put, it is possible that a student learning to build cars doesn't have to start with an actual car engine in front of them. Instructors could use the room to interact with, demonstrate, and even deconstruct a virtual car engine similar to Iron Man.

The room is located on the South-East end of the South City Campus next to the Film Sound Stage. The initial plans for this room (which was included in the Center for New Media project) began in 2008 after former SLCC President Bioteau was inspired by another college's virtual reality capabilities.

Unfortunately, Dr. Bioteau was not able to be reached for a quote concerning the project. The approval and building of the socalled "Virtual Reality Cave" was delayed

many times, and as of this article is mostly unfinished, leaving the promise of a sci-fi scholastic experience to degrade into a rather expensive storage room.

"SLCC doesn't create content or software for virtual reality experiences. Lack of marketing and

the cost to maintain such a room are also likely reasons for the delay in completion," says Smith.

At this time the plan to finish the room

has stalled. Another downside to the Virtual Reality Cave is that students would not have time to learn how to operate the room in the short time most students spend enrolled at SLCC.

One initial idea for the Virtual Reality Cave was to turn it into a photo studio. Another possible use for the room could be to build a cyclorama, a large curved wall that creates no background allowing for green screen effects, for the photography, film, and television students to utilize.

"There's not much we can do about the room now, but there are options to consider for the future." says Smith.

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## Students have option for escort to vehicle after hours at SLCC

Salt Lake Community College wants the best for its students, not just academically, but also in safety.

Students who feel unsafe or uneasy about heading from the campus to their car, are able to contact an officer who will then escort them from inside the building until they are safe within their vehicle.

Ahmad Veradi, who is now the manager for Student Auxiliary Services at South City Campus, administered this program a few years ago for South City.

This service was directed towards students who took night classes, or stayed after hours requiring a trip from campus to car. During the programs peak, an average of four to five calls were made within a week for a police officer to escort an individual to their vehicle. As time passed, less and less calls were made, and the program had to be modified according to the needs of the students.

Although the program is not under an official director or employee, the service is still provided.

If a student feels there is a need for an escort, Varedi recommends calling Student Services and be directed to the Highway Patrol who will safely escort

The Health and Wellness Sevices located on the Taylorsville-Redwood Campus has many new fitness opportunities for students and staff. Not only do they offer personal trainings, but the certified staff focuses on individual health and wellness including healthier lifestyles.

The Health and Activities Lifetime Center (HLAC) offers three different opportunities for personal training. Associate Dean of Health and Lifetime Activities, Soni Adams, has three missions for academic health, which she describes as "The Fit Tech Program, HLAC Activity Courses, and Health Elective Courses."

The FIT Tech program supports students who want to start a career in personal training and a personal lifetime of fitness. This 120 hour program prepares students for multiple fields: kinesiology, exercise physiology, nutrition, behavior modification, fitness assessment, fitness program design, basic principles of weight training, flexibility, and cardio fitness.

The HLAC provides activity courses such as basketball, cross-fit and Zumba. These are courses that can be utilized towards obtaining a general education degree and are elective courses that extend over all health wellness.

Lastly, and perhaps most importantly, these courses can be taken simply to sustain an individual's healthy lifestyle goals while attending college. These opportunities provide many different options for students and staff to improve their overall health and fitness, which includes nutrition and body awareness.

Recently added in the LAC building, SLCC obtained a Bod Pod, a machine that helps measure the current body fat and is open to the public.

This is an opportunity for SLCC staff and students to be able to access the LAC building and utilize the trainings provided to the community. The hours of operation are between 5am and 8am, and 12pm to 9pm. "It's a really, really big deal. The Dahli Llama will be here speaking and there's all kinds of service information and education sessions. A really cool opportunity for our student," Crossland says of the other Fall break opportunity is at the Parliament of the New World Religions in Salt Lake City.

For student already things about spring break the Thayne Center has four Alternative Spring Break trips planed. They include a Hunger and Homelessness focused trip to the Tenderloin Section of San Francisco's transient populations, an Environmental Justice focused trip to Seattle, an Animal Rights-focused trip to Best Friends Animal Sanctuary in Kanab, Utah, and a Cultural Exchange program with the Hopi Reservation in northern

Even if you are unable to go on Alternative Breaks this year there are a myriad of other community-based service opportunities here in the Salt Lake Valley. 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## Veterans center expands services for student vets at SLCC

The Salt Lake Community College Veterans Center is proud to be home to the largest population of Vets in the State. Darlene Head, Manager, SLCC Veterans Service spoke about the new Veteran Services Center opening at the South City Campus. Head was there when SLCC first opened its Veterans Services Center. The main office is located on the Taylorsville Redwood campus, and a new center will open at South City Campus and offer Veterans and dependents a place to study, relax, and learn more about their benefits.

With somewhere between 1,200 and 1,300 veterans enrolled any given Fall or Spring semester, it is hard to imagine that veterans feel like they don't fit on campus. Head was adamant that this is not the case. For years SLCC has been a Veterans Affairs "success story," pioneering many programs now offered. While all this has been traditionally through the main office, the second center is set to open in Spring 2016.

Head was quick to point out that the center is not just for veterans utilizing their education benefits, but is a place for all veterans and their dependents. The new center will feature a lounge, computers with printing costs covered by Veterans Services, as well as staff to help educate veterans on what is available to them.

"If we don't have the resource here, I've been here 33 years, I can assist the veterans in finding it," says Head.

With a visit this past week by a Naval Rear Admiral, it is clear that SLCC's Veterans Services gathers national attention. SLCC has been lucky to be among the first in the nation to run the Vet Success Program. This success has veteran service counselors from other schools seeking training through SLCC.

SLCC President, Deneece Huftalin, was one who championed the need for the center while she was Vice President of Student Services in 2007. SLCC was the first school in Utah to have a Veterans Services Center.

"We couldn't do what we do without the support of our administration," says Head.

Veteran Services offers a variety of services that may not be known to veterans and their dependents. For example, they can be provided a cap and gown upon graduation, and even a special red, white and blue honor cord. For those who might be struggling to assimilate to a classroom setting or are coping with a new disability, Veterans Services can assess the vet's need and help accommodate them in the classroom when possible.

There are a large number of services and support offered to veterans through

## Meet the Thayne Center's Interim Director, Sean Crossland


