Congresswoman Mia Love pays visit to students on campus

In a whirlwind visit to two Salt Lake Community College campuses, congressional delegate, Mia Love, participated in a recorded roundtable interview, with host Nick Burns, Assistant Dean of the School of Communications on the morning of January 19.

"It was fabulous to have Congresswoman Love here on campus today," says SLCC President Huftalin. "She's a great role model for students to be active in their own political process."

Love, who says she is accustomed to traveling to Washington, D.C. during the week and returning home for weekends with her family, went to Taylorsville Redwood Campus, where she attended a noon pizza 'eat and greet' with SLCC students in the Oak Room.

Fielding questions from students, Love addressed the tough issues being delivered like fast balls over the plate.

SLCC Student Body President, Carlos Moreno, asked the congresswoman if she would support a bill to help protect Venezuelans in his country of origin, the HB3744-the Venezuelan Refugee Act. She promised to meet with him on the issue.

"I get very emotional when I talk about my country. There are so many problems with the government," says Moreno.

A student audience member asked how she reacted to the recent election of the new Salt Lake City mayor. Love attended Mayor Biskupski swearing in ceremony and she believes Biskupski is very passionate about the city.

"It's my job to help her do that [succeed]. It's my job to support Utah in every single way," says Love. "By the way, she's a friend of mine and so is Derrick Kitchen."

On education, the congresswoman was asked if she supported free tuition for students. Love thought we should drive the cost of higher education down and that throwing money at it seems to drive up costs.

"It's way over spending. It's why we are hitting those fiscal cliffs all the time," says Love.

Her solution is to get the economy moving so students can gain employment to

help cover the cost of education.

"Why not give some of those funds back to our states?" says Love, "We've got to make sure higher education is accessible."

Love shared a personal story about being self sufficient. She is the youngest of three kids and every time she wanted something, her father would make her write an essay as to why she wanted it and, subsequently, how she was going to pay for a

quarter of it. Love explains, when you are involved, you are in charge of your own success, and you are happy.

Love agreed to follow-up with students on difficult issues and to not give up when fighting for local and national needs. She encourages students to engage in the political process and to move forward with their goals -- and vote.

"It was so inspiring and an amazing experience," says freshman Amber Caine, who is contemplating running for a student body office. "It made me feel like 'We can do it!'... like the Rosie the Riveter from World War II. It made me feel like I have, and that everyone has, a voice."

Students learn new sound techniques from Dolby expert

Last week, Salt Lake Community College students and faculty had the opportunity to hear from Glenn Kiser, the Director of the Dolby Institute. Kiser engaged students with his presentation about "Understanding the Craft of Sound." Kiser said, "I kinda got the bug of movies when I was twelve. I got obsessed with how movies were made." Kiser went to a college that offered film classes where his passion continued to flourish. He moved to L.A. and got his first job as a messenger boy. "One job lead to another," Kiser explained, and he soon ended up

at Skywalker Sound where he oversaw sound work on various projects. Kiser now works for Dolby and provides education and inspiration to aspiring filmmakers

Kiser shared sound production tips for aspiring filmmakers to use so that they may tell their stories with success. He mentioned that filmmakers should "give sound to fill out what you're not shooting," which can be beneficial if you have a tight budget to film your actors with. Another tip he shared was that it's okay to have an "intimate frame, especially if you have heavy sound," meaning that close ups are greatly improved by a large auditory presence, and that sound helps

make the scene. Sound is a helpful tool that helps to "produce greater achievement value," according to Kiser.

Before Kiser ended his presentation, he turned the time over to the audience so they could ask any questions they had. Students benefited greatly from his question and answer segment as well as the presentation overall. Student recieves NAACP scholarship award

When Jeanetta Williams, NAACP-SLC Director, called Salt Lake Community College mechanical engineering student and youth mentor, Alain Villa, to the podium, he felt it was a dream. Villa and his mother, Magdelano Villegas, attended the 32nd annual Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial Luncheon hosted at the downtown Sheraton. Villa felt he had come a long way from his Compton, California roots. Alain's mother, like most parents, wanted a better life for her family.

Villegas, a single working mother, was concerned about the rough street-life and seeing the youth eventually succumb to peer pressures of drugs, gangs and violence.

She knew she had to take drastic steps to change their circumstances. She had heard Salt Lake City was a nice city to raise a family.

"We made the decision to come here," says Villegas, and with the help of a cousin in Utah, she relocated her family 8 years ago.

Villegas had done her best to involve Alain in cultural activities. He participated in a ballet folklorico traditional youth dance group.

She was even willing to take a lower paying job rathar than continue worrying about the danger in the schools and neighborhood.

"Since he was little, he was really good. I didn't want him to grow up with all the violence," says Villegas.

Villa adjusted quickly to the Utah life-style and soon made friends, got involved in swimming, and became a youth volunteer.

He set goals for his life and developed a passion for education. As Villa continued to excel in high school, he wanted to continue to learn more.

Villa believes he couldn't have done well in school without the support of several faculty members. In his acceptance speech, he specifically mentions the President Huftalin as always having an "upbeat attitude" along with support from many of his SLCC advisors and mentors.

"I come from [a family of] hard workers. We're not doctors or lawyers—just really hard workers for our families so our kids can work with their brains and not with their hands," say Villa.

As he considers those whom have influenced his life, he remains grateful to the advisor in the TRIO program that urged him to apply for the scholarship

In his closing remarks, he tearfully acknowledged his mother's sacrifices in paving the way for a better

"Just you and me mom," says Villa.

Villa had just had his birthday and since it just two days away from Dr. King's birthday, it has served as a reminder for him to keep the dream alive. He encourages other dreamers to keep on dreaming.

"I got a lot of support from my mom and I was able to make it -- and I'm still making it," says Villa.

Advice for students parking on campus

Marty came out of class at Salt Lake Community College only to find a parking ticket on his car. However, it was not the first ticket he had received this semester. Earlier in the year, he received a fifty dollar ticket for parking in a handicap zone. He had parked there in desperation for the first weeks of school after driving around the entire campus for twenty-five minutes with no success of finding an empty parking space. Marty found out that he wasn't going to get credit for the semester if he didn't pay these tickets. With money being tight, Marty was now going to have to find a part-time job during finals week just to take care of the cost of the tickets. If only he had remembered to buy a parking pass at the beginning of the year, he wouldn't be in such a mess now.

One concern that SLCC students have is parking.

Students are able to purchase a parking pass on seven of the campuses: Taylorsville Redwood, Jordan, South City, Library Square, Westpointe, Airport, and Miller.

A parking pass for one semester costs \$17.50. An annual parking pass costs \$35 and is valid from the date of purchase to August 31 of the next year.

At the beginning of each semester, there is a grace period for parking so that students can park without a fine until they have time to buy a parking pass. The grace period is usually less than two weeks, so it is wise for students to purchase a temporary pass as soon as they can. in blue.

Once you have your parking pass, it's important for students to know where they are allowed to park. Student parking spaces are marked with yellow lines and faculty parking spaces are marked with blue lines. Handicap zones are in both yellow and blue parking areas and are marked with signs and painted logos on the spaces themselves.



Parking meters are another option for students who need to park on campus.

Disabled students can get a parking pass for the handicap zones on the Taylorsville Redwood Campus only in the Gunderson Facilities Building on the far northwest corner of the campus. Be sure to have your car registration and state handicap forms with you when you go. Students with a Disabled Permit

parking meters. Remember, your parking permit is not valid at meters.

For students who can, it might be wise to take public transportation to avoid the parking crunch on some campuses.

To get bus schedules for SLCC campuses, go to Utah Transit Authority's home page and check

can also park in the student or staff parking spaces when all disabled parking stalls are full.

There are a limited amount of parking spaces at any campus. With about 60,000 students enrolled and ten campus locations, there are not enough spaces for everyone to park their vehicle.

It's helpful to arrive early for class so that you can get a parking space.

Another option for all students is to park at the parking meters. It costs a nickel for six minutes, a dime for twelve minutes, or a quarter for thirty minutes. There is a three-hour limit for using

the Route Maps & Schedules page, or download one of their mobile apps.

Parking fines are usually ten dollars but can cost as much as fifty. If you don't pay the fine within one week, the fine automatically doubles. If you leave your tickets unpaid, at the end of the semester you won't get credit for your classes until the fines are all paid. Your car could also be booted and towed.

Don't forget how important it is to purchase a SLCC parking pass. If you have any questions, contact the front desk at any SLCC campus.
