Classes offer better understanding of finance and credit

The perfect credit score is something that many desire. Having good credit is supposed to mean you have proven how responsible of a consumer you are, but understanding finances and how your credit works can also be very confusing.



SLCC offers several courses to help students better understand the world of finance and credit.

Salt Lake Community College is there to help by offering multiple courses that allows students the ability to better understand how it all works.

Professor of Finance, Dennis Wilson states that in developing a good credit score or profile, the rule of the 5-C's are golden. "It can direct an individual to make wise choices and enjoy the fruits of good money management which includes a good credit score," Wilson said.

According to Wilson, the 5-C's of credit include:



SLCC offers several courses to help students better understand the world of finance and credit.

- 1. Character: fulfilling promises starts with always doing what you say you'll do.
- 2. Capacity: this is a measure of your available cash-flow to meet monthly obligations. Fixed obligations should be less than 20 percent of your gross monthly income.
- 3. Capital: your reserves or savings for emergency plus additional net worth after your total debt.
- 4. Collateral: when borrowing, lenders typically offer better rates and terms if you finance tangible assets with market value and pledge these assets in the event you are unable to repay the loan.
- 5. Conditions: economic conditions play a large part in the availability of credit. In a recession, lenders are very cautious and credit extension is limited. It is just the opposite if the economy is expanding.

For students who want to explore credit and finance, whether it be for personal or professional reasons, Professor Wilson, as well as other professors, offer Personal Finance 1050 classes.

The classes are available at the Jordan, Taylorsville, and South City Campus as well as the option to take the class online.

A table will also be set up in the events hallway at the student center on February 11 and 12. Alternatively, valentines and donations can be delivered to Enrollment Services at the Jordan and South City campuses by February 12 at noon. Participating in the drive is easy.

"You don't have to write a novel," said Veteran's Services Specialist, Alicia Pia. "You can write something as simple as 'Happy V-Day'. It works. They pretty much appreciate anything they can get."

Veterans Services Manager, Darlene Head, encourages students and staff alike to participate.

"Come and write a message of love or support for our military members and veterans. Let them know you appreciate their service to the country and to the world," said Head.

Valentines can be made at home and brought to the office or you can add a personal note to the pre-made patriotic valentines that are available at the locations mentioned above.

Donations of a dollar or more are appreciated to help cover expenses for packaging, postage, and

purchasing candy.

Soldiers of all kinds will receive the valentines. Deliveries are made to four Veteran's Administration hospitals in Utah (Salt Lake City, Ogden, Payson, and Ivins), three Veteran Transitional Housing Centers (Valor House and Freedom Landing in SLC, and Saint Anne's in Ogden), and to units serving overseas.

All valentines will be read to determine which venue is most appropriate for the given message. A message wishing a veteran to "get well" might be

sent to a VA hospital, whereas one saying "we're praying for you" would most likely be sent to a soldier overseas.

If you have a special soldier or veteran you'd like to receive valentines, you can request to have a box of 250 valentines, stuffed with candy, sent to any military member or veteran that is serving in the states, deployed overseas, or an honored veteran at home.

Soldiers who receive the boxes are encouraged to share the contents with their fellow service members.

By participating in this drive, you will be helping to carry out a long standing tradition that was started by Ms. Head.

When she was just a child, she began writing messages to give to veterans returning from Vietnam. During Desert Storm, she and her three children began sending valentines to soldiers serving overseas.

Over 32,000 valentines/letters of support have been collected for veterans and active duty military members since 2008.

Ms. Head, a Korean War veteran's daughter, feels that while appreciating those who sacrifice in combat is vital, we should remember that they provide service beyond that realm.

"A lot of people don't talk about how our service members provide humanitarian service all over the world," said Head.

The Veterans Services Office at the Redwood Campus in Taylorsville is open from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. Take a moment to drop by with a valentine message of your own by February 14th.

"It's painless," said Miss Pia, "Unless you get a paper cut."

Narrowing Choices

Have you narrowed down your potential occupational choices to a few? Determining your career choices, although seemingly difficult at first, becomes easier as you gather more information and assess your likes and dislikes. Some strategies to narrow your choices are:

- * Create a "pro and con" list for each occupation, or compare them against different factors.
- * Visit with SLCC department coordinators and faculty to learn more about major and career opportunities. * Visit Student Employment and Cooperative Education See www.slcc.edu/seces
- * Obtain a snapshot of the current outlook in a field by going to various websites to check out how many positions exist at present in this field. Some include: https://slcc.emsicareercoach.com/; https://jobs.utah.gov.
- * Perform an informational interview, where you ask questions from experts in that field.
- * Apply for internships or summer jobs.
- * Get involved in volunteer work by contacting the Thayne Center for Service and Learning, www.slcc.edu/thaynecenter, or contact employers directly.
- * Ask close friends or family members to review your career exploration results and discuss them with you.

Evaluate

It is important to choose a major and a career that will be satisfying for you over time. If you are still unsure of your preferences, don't get discouraged. Career planning takes time and effort! Your options at this point at SLCC may be:

- * Choose an area of study that you love! You will enjoy your classes and your college experience more fully.
- Continue your career advising sessions.
- * Enroll in a class that covers career exploration.
- * Choose introductory major courses to explore different majors.
