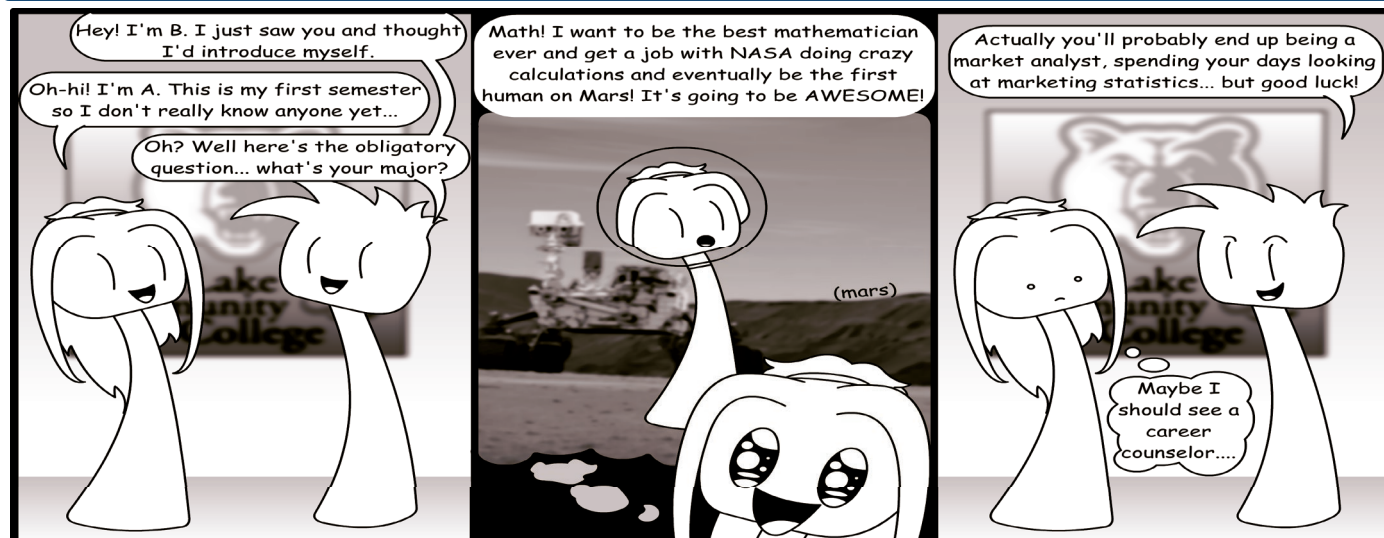

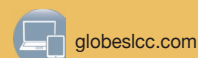

Science Resource Building houses **tutoring** assistance for students

The Science Resource Building, or as some students call “The Student Lifesaver Building” is located at Salt Lake Community College’s Redwood campus.

Tutors assist students on subjects such as biology, chemistry, physics, engineering and geosciences.

The building is open Monday-Thursday 9 a.m. - 8 p.m. and Friday 9 a.m. - 6 p.m. and offers open tutoring.

“No appointment. Walk in tutor[s] are available[,], you come in and can get tutored right away depending [on] how busy it is,” says Jory Lusk, a tutor at the Science Resource Building.

Though the Science Resource Building gets busy around testing time, Lusk mentions that they have more than enough tutors on hand to handle those busy times.

Tutors are always available and willing to jump back and forth to help students with the subject they need help with.

Tutors may not be able to sit down with students for a great amount of time, they will do their best to make sure students understand the subject material.

There is no time limit on how long you can stay at the tutoring center.

“However long they need help with a concept. One way to learn is to puzzle it out. You sit down and help them puzzle it out until they can puzzle it out

“The best thing about the resource building is probably meeting new people. Sometimes you find people in your class or other classes, that can also help you. You also won’t feel stupid asking a question like you would in a classroom. There are very nice people there,” says SLCC student, Katherine Vega.

The Science Resource Center is a convenient resource for students. All students who are having troubles are encouraged to look into tutoring.

“You may have trouble finding tutors who specialize in your subject, but for the most part it is not exactly hard finding a tutor at the center,” says Vega.

Taylorsville Redwood Campus is Salt Lake Community College's main campus and offers resources that other campuses may not. If you want to take advantage of everything SLCC has to offer, here are four resources available to every student at the Redwood Campus that will help make your SLCC experience even greater.

Library

If you are having trouble finding a quiet place to study, do homework, or work on a paper, visit the quiet and expansive library, located in the Markosian building. If you need to find reliable sources of information for one your classes, the library is where to go, containing print books, newspapers, access to electronic databases and reference titles (which include full text articles and indexing/abstracting services), e-books, e-journals, online video resources, popular movies, even a plastic human skeleton for those working on a science credit.

The library offers students free access to online newspapers and other online content that you would be behind a paywall outside of school.

Are you having trouble figuring out how to start your required e-portfolio? Library staff also can provide assistance with e-portfolios, research, and training to assist in using the library's resources, and as always the only library card you need is your SLCC OneCard. Bruin Campus Food Pantry gives back to students

In case you weren't aware, college is an expensive undertaking. Students are balancing tuition, housing, and textbooks; between all this, the SLCC Social Work Association Club didn't want food to be cut from students' budgets. To address this problem, the Social Work Club created the Bruin Campus Food Pantry, located at the South City Campus, to help keep students from worrying about food in the midst of other stressful situations.

Daniel Poole, faculty adviser to the SWAC, states "Many of our students are making choices about buying text books or food. The pantry provides a little bit of support to help give our students the opportunity to focus more on their studies as they push forward on their path to achieving great success."

The Bruin Food Pantry, located in room 2-152 at South City Campus, now has new hours, with the goal of giving students more opportunities to stop by. The Food Pantry is now open from Monday 12-2:30 p.m., Tuesday 3-5 p.m., Wednesday 10 a.m.-12 p.m., Thursday 12-2 p.m. and 3-5 p.m.

Supplies are limited, but students are welcome to take two bags of food home each month. In addition to food, the pantry tries to keep hygiene items like soaps, feminine

products and baby items in stock. The only thing students need to provide is a current One Card at the door!

To keep stocked, the pantry has partnered with the Utah Food Bank, while also relying on donations from the college community, students and food drives.

A supply of food is not the only thing that keeps the pantry open, as a dedicated team of staff and volunteers help the pantry function.

Kimberly Duran, a part-time student, is staffed by the pantry, and says of the experience, "I like working here because it gives me the chance to help other students like myself."

Many of the Social Work Club members volunteer with the pantry. Svwanta Shah, a full-time student from Nepal, says she gained a new perspective on the importance of a food pantry and enjoys being able to help other students.

If you would like to help out, students are invited to volunteer at the pantry as well as drop off donations in the drop box outside the pantry. Clubs or groups can get involved by holding food drives or getting members signed up to volunteer.

The Salt Lake Community College OneCard is more than just a student I.D. It's your key to campus life.

The SLCC OneCard gives you instant access to your financial aid and can be used anywhere Discover cards are accepted. It also allows students to have access to a pre-paid debit card, UTA discounts, campus retail discounts/incentives, meal plans, and computer labs for printing.

Leticia Vigil, a 21-year old freshman at SLCC, was asked if she had a OneCard and knew the benefits of having one.

"Yes, I just picked one up last month when the semester started and I love the pre-paid debit card option! Also I thought it was neat how I was able to load my card with my financial aid and get the refund faster. Its easy and convenient," says Vigil.

The OneCard makes it easy and convenient for SLCC students to avoid waiting for their Financial Aid through the mail and allows them to receive their refund faster. The refund is placed on the OneCard and the funds are available immediately for use. The convenient reloadable card makes it easy to access funds through Allpoint ATM's and there are also checks that come with the OneCard that can be cashed for free at any Wal-Mart location.

The OneCard gives students access to the B-line intercampus shuttle for free.

Duayne Wall, a 19-year old sophomore at SLCC was asked if he used the OneCard for more than just identification. His response was, "I use the OneCard almost everyday. I have my classes split up between the Taylorsville and South City campuses so it's nice not having to worry about driving back and forth."

The OneCard is free for SLCC students. If card is lost, there is a replacement fee for staff/faculty for \$20. You will need proper photo identification, such as state issued drivers license, passport, or government issued identification to obtain OneCard. Truth In Tuition Wednesday March 2, 2016 *Taylorsville Redwood Campus* *Student Event Center* *11:00 - 11:45 a.m.*

Did you know that tuition at the public colleges and universities in Utah is divided into two categories: first-tier and second-tier? First-tier tuition is determined by the State Board of Regents and affects all USHE institutions.

Second-tier tuition is determined by individual institutions and used to address institutional specific needs.

It is anticipated that the State Board of Regents' proposed 2016-17 first-tier tuition increase might range from 0% to 5%. Salt Lake Community College is proposing a 0% to 3% second-tier tuition increase. Together, the proposed tuition increases for next year could range from \$0 to \$125 per semester for a full-time resident undergraduate student.

Please plan to attend this presentation and learn more about the proposed tuition increase.

Poet Laureate curates **poetry reading** series on campus

When English professor Lisa Bickmore was named Poet Laureate by SLCC president Deneese G. Huftalin last spring, Bickmore proposed that part of her job would be to “organize and curate a poetry reading series, as SLCC has never had a reading series.”

The poetry reading series commenced on the evening of Thursday, Feb. 11, 2016, at SLCC’s South City Campus multipurpose room, and featuring guest poet Tarfia Faizullah.

Bickmore stated that she chose Faizullah for the inaugural event because of her work in the book *Seam*, a collection of Faizullah’s poetry about Bangladeshi women who had been raped by Pakistani soldiers as a military tactic during the Liberation War of 1971. Bickmore felt that Faizullah’s work was “a powerful reminder” of what poetry and other creative genres can do. “The work of making history visible, of amplifying the voices of those we have not heretofore heard, of showing us with great vividness worlds to which we have not attended.”

At Faizullah’s reading, Bickmore thanked President Huftalin and SLCC’s Provost of Academic Affairs, Clifton Sanders, whom she said provided the funding for the event and for the series. She also expressed gratitude for the support and guidance of the English Department Associate Dean, Stephen Ruffus and Administrative Assistant Diane Edmonds; the School of Humanities and Social Sciences Dean, John McCormick, and Administrative Assistant, Karen Hoffman.

In addition to sharing her poetry at Thursday’s reading, Faizullah visited poetry

and publication studies classes and led a public forum to discuss critical poetry writing.

In response to queries about how the next event will be publicized, Bickmore responded, “I’m going to try to work with Institutional Marketing to get a more stable information source on SLCC’s website, and students can always contact me for information about upcoming events.”

Professor Bickmore’s plan is to have a reading every spring and fall semester. Currently, she is working on selecting a poet to read in the fall of 2016. She would appreciate any suggestions for future guest poets. “I’m looking for readers from outside SLCC,” Bickmore wrote in an email, “mainly to bring in widely diverse voices we wouldn’t be likely to hear otherwise.” She can be contacted via email at lisa.bickmore@slcc.edu.
