

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

Adding to the list of perks your OneCard offers, Salt Lake Community College is helping students with the addition of the Bruin Meal Plan.

Nicci Rivetti, Food Services Manager at Taylorsville Redwood Campus says, "the Bruin Meal Plan is a meal card that students can load money on and earn a 5% discount every time they use it at any of our dining locations."

The Bruin Meal Plan gives even more of an incentive for students to eat on campus with a newly added feature, for every \$50 you place on your OneCard Bruin Meal Plan you will receive a \$10 bonus credit to spend on food. You can receive this \$10 bonus up to 5 times. These funds cannot be withdrawn and must be used at SLCC food courts.

You can spend this Bruin Meal Plan balance at any of the following food service locations: Taylorsville Redwood, South City, Miller, and Jordan Campus. These locations are a great place to get fresh food. "We offer nutritious and delicious foods in multiple varieties as we are making all of our foods from scratch [with the exception of a few items at South City Campus]," says Rivetii.

Be aware that your Bruin Meal Plan balance will expire after a year if you do not use or add any funds to your account.

One of the food services department goals is to help students with on campus options for meals.

"The benefit to students eating on campus is that it is conveniently located on campus, and the pricing structure of our entire food court is framed to fit a student's budget," says Rivetti.

Going along the theme of discount meals for students, Food Services also offers bruin bowls.

"This program is designed to offer meals under \$3.00. We have a mac and cheese station or soup station along with a fresh made bread stick for lunch, and offer hot cereals such as steel cut oats and grits in the morning," says Rivetti.

With all of these food options for students, it makes it easier for students to sit down for lunch and enjoy a nice meal or grab a quick to-go inbetween classes. To sign up for the Bruin Meal Plan, bring your OneCard to any of the info desks at the Taylorsville Redwood, South City, Miller, Jordan, or West Valley SLCC Campuses and start enjoying the perks of your OneCard and the Bruin Meal Plan today.

# Avariety of campus locations serving a variety of students

Salt Lake Community College has multiple campuses spread all around the Salt Lake Valley. Each one of these campuses offers its own array of courses and specialties. Getting to know each campus and the services it offers will not only give you info on things you may not know SLCC had, it will give you options on where you can look for classes and programs.

The Taylorsville Redwood Campus is SLCC's main campus and administrative headquarters. This Campus has multiple buildings servicing many different programs and activities. The Lifetime Activities Center is located at this campus and is open for students to work out, play extramural sports, join athletic clubs, etc. The Student Center is also unique to the many SLCC campuses. This building houses many services for students such as the Bookstore, Food Services, Financial Aid, Health & Wellness, and many more.

SLCC's downtown location is the Library Square Center. This location offers general education courses along with a paralegal program with an extensive law library and multiple interior design and fashion courses. The SLCC Community Writing Center is in the Salt Lake City Library and can aid students with writing coaching and workshops.

South City Campus focuses on Humanities, Performing Arts, and New Media Technologies programs along with offering general education courses. South City Campus houses the Grand Theatre, which holds a full theatre performance schedule and displays artistic cultural programming year round.

The Meadowbrook Campus location offers classes focused on occupational or career education. These career programs for fields of Applied Technology give hands-on training and labs for areas such as HVAC systems and electrical work.

The Jordan Campus contains the Health Sciences Center and the SLCC's Allied Health Programs. These Allied Health and Health Professions programs offer classes for training students in fields such as Nursing, Medical Assistants, and Physical Therapist Assistant.

The Miller campus in Sandy houses SLCC's Culinary Institute, The Miller Business

Resource Center, and Miller Automotive Training. The Utah Department of Public Safety also has its training facilities at this campus including a facility for the Utah Highway Patrol, Firing Range, and the Department of Correction training academy.

The West Valley Center holds classes mainly for general education courses and introductory subjects.

SLCC also has an Airport Campus, this location offers Aviation Technology Training and Aviation Maintenance Technician Certification.

The Westpointe Center is currently under construction and is predicted to be finished by the summer of 2018. This Campus location will hold a wide range of Career and Technical Education classes including manufacturing programs and general education courses.

There is also SLCC Online, this online method that contains 10,000 students per semester with more than 200 courses in 50 different subjects. This gives the option to obtain degrees or certificates completely online. While attending online courses you are provided with 24/7 tech support, free online tutoring, and advising.





The Markosian Library at the Redwood Campus is where students can learn more about resources being offered.

The SLCC Library system is a great resource for students to receive a myriad of services that many don't know about.

The SLCC Library Services offers course materials on a hard copy reserve and an eReserve format. Hard copy reserve materials are received from faculty members and registered to the library system. Students can search the online reserve desk to find materials and the campus library where they are being held. With your OneCard you can visit the library and rent the class materials for four hours. Students cannot leave the library with course reserve materials and will be charged \$20 for damaging any reserve items.

The course eReserves are similar to the hard copy reserves except they are instructor specific and available online. Students can go online to ereserve.slcc. edu/eres/default.aspx find the instructor, then type in the course password to access online course materials.

Students can also request materials to be added to these course reserves. The reserve request form is online at libweb.slcc.edu/services/reserve-material to request to have useful materials be added to the library.

A new feature was launched that allows students to receive help from a SLCC librarian. Text 66746 and in the body of the text type "Elie" followed by a question. A librarian will reply to the text with an answer. Librarians are also available to meet with Students in person to answer questions. After speaking with Zack Allred, Assistant Director for Instruction & Liaison Services.

"Librarians are available to meet with students, faculty, staff and anyone else who has questions about research, information, books, films, or anything else," says

Allred

SLCC is making advances with other universities to further assist their students with availability of information.

"SLCC students can take their OneCard to any college or university library in the state and check out their resources, use their computers, and have access to their library as if they were a student at that school," says Allred.

Interlibrary Loans provides students, faculty, and staff a large amount of information not available at SLCC's Libraries. ILL can provide you with borrowed materials not owned by SLCC. Articles, catalogues, research papers, books, and other materials from around the country can be obtained from SLCC or other state university libraries. ILL has a list of frequently asked questions at libweb.slcc.edu/services/inter-library-loan-guideline where you can answer any questions you may have about the guidelines to borrowing items.

SLCC Library Services has a massive amount of information on their search website at libweb.slcc.edu/. From this site students can search through library services, digital archives of information posted by SLCC such as past newsletters or student newspapers, online exhibits, and even research subjects.

SLCC Lib Guides contain information on subjects pertaining to SLCC classes or services the Library offers. These guides are compiled by SLCC librarians and house an amazing amount of information. One of these services is free New York Times access for students.

Writing assistance is also offered from the Library website with an online reference desk, research tools, citation guides and more.

# Bogged down? Visit the Student Writing Center for help

In case you were unaware of what you were getting into as a college student, you'll be writing. There's no avoiding it. All students have to be proficient writers and most classes require writing throughout the course work. Now for most of us we aren't born with excellent writing skills. So what's a student to do? For those who aren't the next Jack Kerouac we may want some assistance with our writing.

The Student Writing Center (SWC) is available for all students to aid you with your writing. Many students find that in the realms of the classroom, the writing assignment given to them seems understandable. Like a magical fogging mist that settles after class is out, you realize it's not quite as simple as it seemed. Are you bogged down in research and suffering from information overload in your paper? Perhaps you have no idea how to analyze your audience. What exactly is a rhetorical situation? At the Student Writing Center, clarification on all these points is attainable.

The SWC is willing to answer all your questions. No question is too small or big for the staff and Student-staff at the SWC. There are a few things to keep in mind when using the services.

"It helps if students bring the original assignment in with them to help (us) get a better idea of the rhetorical situation, According to the student writing center coordinator Clint Gardner.

It also helps if students have a few questions already formulated about the assignment as well as any notes that were taken on the assignment.

The purpose of the SWC is to open up a dialogue about writing. According to the SWC web page on slcc.com "it's easier to learn about (a subject) when you have an open discussion about it."

The student-tutors and staff at the SWC are there to bounce ideas off of as much as they are there for clarification. From writing styles like AP and MLA to audience analysis and rhetoric, the SWC is there to help.

If you want to set up an appointment to speak to someone at the SWC there are several ways to do it. You can drop in anywhere from 8 am to around 6 pm depending on the location. You'll have to provide your One Card and sign in as well as select the tutor of your choice, if you have a preference.

There are six locations for the Student Writing Center. If you can't find the time to visit one of these centers in person you can also use the SWC online writing advising. There are three different formats for online tutoring. You can ask quick questions like how to cite a source from a magazine. You can brain storm ideas with tutors.

For more in depth questions you can set up and email tutoring session so that you can get more in depth questions. In more personal fashion you can set up 'real time tutoring' where in video chat you can ask questions and get answers all in your pajamas.

The SWC at Taylorsville Redwood has a non-circulating library of books all about writing. You can stop by at any time between 8-6 to access those resources. See



# Advising: getting through college without all the guesswork

One of the toughest things you will do in your college career is decide on a major. Luckily there are some tools and advisors geared specifically toward helping you choose your career and major path. Take advantage of these to help with your plan during your stay at Salt Lake Community College.

There are plenty of online assessment tools that career advisors use to assist in helping you choose a career. After speaking with L. Michelle Tuitupou, Academic and Career Advisor 3 – Career Emphasis, she said "There are several online career assessment tools we prefer beginning with the Myers Briggs Type Indicator (MBTI) and Strong Interest Inventory (SII). These assessments come at a low cost but include an initial advising session to receive their results as well as follow up sessions and tasks that follow the career decision making model."

These assessments are a way for students to get a better understanding of their strengths and gain some insight on what they want to achieve. Paired with the ability to meet with a career advisor to help you expand on the results, these are a great tool for students to use.

There are also some free options when looking for assessment tests. Tuitupou said, "The Major and Career Discovery Series (MCDS), is a free online Canvas course for current students that walks them through the career decision making process including taking a personality assessment, exploring career options using tools such as job shadowing, information interviews, volunteering, and coming up with a short list of career and major options."

You can explore a few more career assessments at slcc.edu/academicadvising/career-advising/index.aspx. Take some of these tests at your own pace to get started on your career advising process. SLCC also offers a great online chat advising appointment Tuitupou said, "Online advising chats are offered at various hours and answered by trained academic and career advisors. This format is great for students who are unable to travel to an SLCC campus and need quick information regarding the institution."

Before you come in for an advising appointment there are some steps apart from taking the career assessment tests that will help you get the most out of your visit. I asked Tuitupou what she believes help students prepare most, and she said,


"The best way for students to prepare for an advising appointment is to create a list of questions they can ask during their advising session. I have found that students who have completed some research on their part and come into a session with questions leave feeling satisfied with their visit."

Having these steps prepared prior to your visit really helps you get into much more useful information rather than the advisor covering things you can find out for yourself. Tuitupou recommended, "For career advising, a student who has a short of list of ideas for majors and careers after taking an assessment and researching possibilities can then meet with an advisor with a possible plan of action."

After taking the recommended steps when you are undecided head over to slcc.edu/academicadvising/locations-hours.aspx to find hours and locations of academic and career advising appointments. The career advising department at Taylorsville Redwood campus can offer specialized help for undecided students.




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
