Get connected at the spring meet & greet

The School of Arts, Communication & Media will be a hosting a meet & greet Thursday, January 19th from 11 A.M. to 1 P.M. in the South City Campus multipurpose room. Students will have the opportunity to connect with professors, ask questions and discuss the school's various programs over refreshments.

Josh Elstein, Program Manager for the Center for Arts and Media, describes the event as a chance for students and teachers to get to know each other.

"My advice? Keep in touch with your teachers. It might just turn out to be mutually rewarding, both personally and professionally," says Elstein. "The reality of most industries is that people hire people they already know."

The function is relatively new and uniquely geared to students at the South City Campus.

"When you're working on a film, you're going to be reaching out to music students for your score or to graphic design students for your graphics," says Elstein. "You're going to be working with the theater department for your actors -- you're going to be reaching out in this professional networking way throughout your studies here."

Although arts and communication students can take professional advantage of the meet & greet, everyone is invited. General education students might ask about areas of study they're interested in or connect with other students.

"Part of being a college student is making these connections with your fellow students," says Elstein.

Another part is making connections with teachers. Stephen Williams, who was recently hired to teXAach a screenwriting class, spoke on the importance of connecting with teachers.

"Five years ago I ran into a former teacher at 24-Hour Fitness," says Williams. "He called out to me, 'Stephen, come over here! I need to talk to you!'

They then exchanged contact information and, several weeks later, Williams was brought on to be a script doctor for a feature documentary.

"The experience opened up a new tributary in my professional life," says Williams.

Student Services and academic advisors will be attending the event. Dean Scott, prior to his notable "Pizza with the Dean," also has plans to make the rounds.

"If students have any questions, they can get those answered all in one place at the meet and greet," says Elstein. "It's a very casual setting where you can talk to them, ask them questions, learn about the different programs."

Each person at the event has something to offer. Students are encouraged to take advantage of this opportunity to network with others in their field of study.

The Bruins men's basketball team had their conference home opener Saturday night after playing their first three games on the road. The Bruins entered the game against College of Southern Idaho with a 2-1 record in conference play, after barely escaping with a win against Colorado Northwestern CC.

College of Southern Idaho was 2-1 in conference play and had a 15-2 record over-all entering the match up with the Bruins. With the Bruins having a similar record coming in, the game had the makings of being a blockbuster matchup in SWAC play.

The Bruins got out to a 6-0 start early and was able to build on that lead thanks to a strong play in the paint by TJ Oliver, who went beast mode on CSI around the

The Bruins had a 15-point lead in the first half and were rolling right along due to the hot hand of the riflemen, Cooper Holt, who went 3-4 from behind the arc and finished the half with 11 points. The Golden Eagles did claw their way back to get within 6 points, but the Bruins closed the first half of play with a 10-point lead.

In the second half the Bruins continued to push the pace of the game.

The Golden Eagles were more than happy to run with the Bruins. In the open court. Cristian Gray chased down a Golden Eagles player and slammed a layup attempt off the backboard.

The Golden Eagles did find some momentum and managed to get the game to a 5-point deficit midway in the second half. The Bruins composed themselves with some heady plays by Cooper Holt, who found some loose balls at keys times and knocked down some big shots. Christian Gray had 19 points and Dalven Brushier who had 13 points broke the game wide open and put the Golden Eagles back in the nest for

The Bruins had three players in double figures, led by TJ Oliver with 21 points who displayed amazing athleticism on the boards, finishing with 13 rebounds in total. Cooper Holt went 7-11 from the field, 5-7 from 3-point land and finished with 19 points. The final score was 96 -80 and Coach Phillips' Bruins go to 3-1 in conference play and 15-3 overall.

Up next for the Bruins is a matchup with Utah State Eastern at the Lifetime Activities Center located at the Taylorsville Redwood campus.
