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Mayor Biskupski speaks to students on leadership

Salt Lake City Mayor Jackie Biskupski took some time out of her schedule to visit the SLCC Taylorville, Redwood Campus on Feb. 15, 2017, to share her knowledge and experiences with leadership in the community with SLCC students.

Mayor Biskupski is Salt Lake City's first openly gay Mayor and only the second female Mayor to serve. She is a former member of the Utah House of Representatives, representing the 30th District in Salt Lake County from 1999 to 2011. With a degree in criminal justice from Arizona State University, she worked for Salt Lake County Sheriff Jim Winder on his leadership Team.

While speaking to the students Mayor Biskupski talked about the importance of working with everyone even if you don't agree that everyone has something they bring to the table. She also gave insight on her leadership style giving an example of making sure she consults experts on anything being worked on, she likes getting input from everyone she can. Mayor Biskupski said she has worked and still works with former Candidates that have ran against her.

"Collaboration is one of your greatest tools and you never know who you are going to collaborate with never, holding grudges, being angry and putting a circle around somebody as though you could never work with them is a huge mistake." Said Mayor Biskupski.

Throughout her Speech, Mayor Biskupski kept with the theme of collaborating, working together and communication on how to be a good leader. She also said you need to get out there and listen to who you serve to know what they want and need this way you know what their opinions are and how to best represent their needs. She also said she doesn't mind when people want to talk to her when she is out and about even at the grocery store as long as she can keep shopping while talking, though. Mayor Biskupski asked if anyone had any more questions after her time had run out and said that if so come outside the room and she would talk even went as far as to say to walk to her car and talk. This went with what the Mayor had been talking about wanting to make sure she was able to talk to anyone that wanted to talk.

Mayor Biskupski said rather than set behind a computer or complain about what's going on to feel free to contact her via email, phone call or even come to her office or you can even schedule an event like this one to have her speak she said. Annual Tuition Review and Forecast for 2017-18

Did you know that tuition at the public colleges and universities in Utah is divided into two categories: first-tier and second-tier? First-tier tuition is determined by the State Board of Regents and affects all USHE institutions. Second-tier tuition is determined by individual institutions and used to address institutional specific needs.

It is anticipated that the State Board of Regents' proposed 2017-18 first-tier tuition increase might range from 0% to 5%. Salt Lake Community College is proposing a 0% to 3% second-tier tuition increase. Together, the proposed tuition increases for next year could range from \$0 to \$129 per semester for a full-time resident undergraduate student.

Salt Lake Community College is currently constructing a new Career and Technical Education campus on Salt Lake City's west side that is set to open in 2018.

At a cost of \$43 Million, the 121,000 square-foot Westpointe Career and Technical Education Center will be the new home for many of the CTE programs that SLCC offers. SLCC is the largest supplier of applied technology courses in the Salt Lake area and that is sure to be reinforced with the addition of the new campus.

The project broke ground on June 1, 2016. The center is located at 2150 W. Dauntless Ave., and is close proximity to the airport and several large businesses. Several of SLCC's business partners are located in the surrounding area, which contributed to the decision to build at that location.

"We knew that we needed a better facility, a more nimble facility, a facility that would really teach students in an integrated flexible way," says SLCC President, Deneece Huftalin. "It's going to be beautiful. It's going to be high-tech, and we want it to be iconic. We want people driving south on I-215 to say, 'What is that space? I want to be in that space.' We want it to be a symbol for career and technical education and the importance of workforce in Salt Lake County. So, we're excited to watch that happen."

Over 28,000 students are enrolled in CTE programs at SLCC. The new campus is aiming to serve them and meet their needs, as well as the ever-growing needs of the technological and mechanical workforce. The center will house many of the CTE programs that SLCC already offers, in addition to some new ones. Some of the programs that will be offered in the new building will include: Advanced Composites, Electronics Assembly, Solar Energy Technology, and Industrial Robotics.

The facility will benefit regular students, as well as employees looking to add new skill sets or those looking to improve their chances in high-growth areas. Along with general education and major-specific classes, the campus will provide specific career training. Another goal of the center is to provide flexible and high quality training for current and future jobs that will positively impact and effect the economic future of Utah.

Westpointe residents see the addition of the center as an asset that will help their community take another step in the direction that they want to move in. "It's really going to change the lives of many, many individuals. You will make things happen here. To me, it's just changing lives for many working, poor families that are looking for a better opportunity," says Utah State Senator, Luz Escamilla

Salt Lake Community College offers free tutoring for all students through the Tutoring and Learning Centers throughout the school year in order to improve and accomplish their learning

Tutoring and Learning Centers are located on all SLCC campuses, excluding the Aviation Center and Meadowbrook. The center offer free tutoring on different subjects such as Math, Statistics, Biology, Chemistry, Accounting, Computer Science, Nursing, Languages and many more.

"You're welcome to come anytime." Bob, Math Physics tutor said.

Students can meet with the tutors one-on-one or walk-ins, each student has 15 hours per semester and can also study by themselves on the lower level of the Markosian Library where group study rooms computers, and textbook and model checkout are

Tutors walk around the area helping each student during drop-ins and answer questions, clarify concepts and work problems together with the student. Focused tutoring is also available and has as a goal to provide two one-hour tutoring per week every semester, and will allow deeper focus on the

Most of the campuses offer the Student Writing Center and e-Portfolio Center, however only Taylorsville offers the Business Resource Center, Center for Languages, and Academic Literacy Center. Each tutoring center has a different schedule. Services are offered from Monday to Saturday, depending on the center.

Tutoring is available during spring, summer and fall and the locations are open on Saturdays. Appointments can be scheduled online through the Center's official website slcc.edu/tutoring. Walk-ins are welcomed, along with online tutoring which is now available and is completely free. SLCC offers tutoring from brainfuse.com and Math tutoring is available 24/7 through each student's Canvas

Starting last year, SLCC begun A win-win with SLCC Tutoring which consists of getting stamps by each tutoring center on a punch card. By completing this card with five punches, students will be entered for a chance to win prizes. Students can receive punches from any resource centers, including the Academic Literacy Center, B.R.I.C, Center for Languages, e-Portfolio, GIS and Geosciences, Math Lab, Science Resource Center, Student Writing Center, Trio Student Support Services, Trio STEM and the Tutoring and Learning Center. 
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
Student OneCard gets a makeover

The Money Network Edu app allows you to customize your notifications based on delivery location and account balance.

For the student frequently off-campus, the app also has a map feature, where users can see exactly where the closest compatible ATM is.

The OneCard is a multifaceted card available to all students enrolled in at least one class at SLCC. Not only is it an ID and Bruin Bucks account card, but the card can also serve as a Money Network® Mastercard and UTA bus pass once activated.

This semester saw a major change in OneCards. The college, thanks in part to a better deal with Mastercard, changed the standard blue student cards. Taneth Grey, who assists students with their OneCards, says the transition has went better than expected.

"At first their were a lot of hiccups because production of the cards got screwed up and we got them on the first day classes had started instead of the week beforehand to get everything worked out, but currently I haven't heard a whole lot of complaints [...]."

Students can easily pick up the new card if they still haven't by going to any OneCard Station. A photo ID is all that is required. For students who are still holding the older Discover Card, they too can replace their old one free of charge. Otherwise, for lost cards, the fee is twenty dollars.

"Sometimes if there's a photo from a previous card and there's not a hat or something then," says Nate Chrysler, a OneCard station worker, "we can just keep that same photo. Otherwise we take a brand new photo of them when we make the card."

On every OneCard are two magnetic stripes. The thinner stripe is for the Money Network® account and can be used wherever Mastercards are accepted if the students choose to activate it. To do this, the process is quite simple.

"When you get your card you have to wait 24 hours and then call the number right below it," Chrysler says. Once you've followed the prompts, he continues, "then this becomes just a debit card with MasterCard."

The thicker magstripe holds the Bruin Bucks account information and can be used most anywhere on campus. This includes college cafeterias and bookstores, the LAC (Lifetime Activities Center), and computer labs. The account can be reached through ID centers, Cashier Services, or any college self-deposit kiosks where deposits are easiest.

Students that receive refunds through their OneCard can transfer the money to a personal account, or pay bills directly from the app itself.

An advantage to having money on the Bruin Bucks OneCard are the discounts. Although it may vary the percentage of discount from location or service, the cafeteria, for instance, is 10% off when purchased with Bruin Bucks.

The OneCard can also be used as a heavily discounted bus pass. Monthly bus rates now are 15\$ per month for current SLCC students--which is far cry from the 83.75\$ listed on the UTA website.

"A lot of times student discounts are outside the school as well," Grey says, "like arcades often have student discounts, theaters, things like that. You use your card to get those student discounts."

Places like The Abravanel Hall and The Leonardo Museum are examples of places that offer these discounts; this as well as a myriad of others that can be found through simply asking or websites such as Studentrate.com.

It falls on the student to take advantage of being a student; a good step, if you haven't already done so, would be to get a OneCard and take advantage of its uses
