As part of Disability Awareness Week, the Disability Resource Center hosted an Assistive Technology Fair on Wednesday, Sept. 20th in the South City Campus atrium. The Assistive Technology Fair was to raise awareness at Salt Lake Community College about how technology is advancing to further help students with disabilities.

The technology showcased can benefit everyone, not just those with disabilities.

"Everybody can benefit from the Assistive Technology Fair because it shows how people with disabilities adapt to the communities," says High School Transition Accessibility Advisor, Daniel Dewitt. "Nobody is a loser, everyone is a winner."

There were about a dozen booths all highlighting different resources and opportunities. A few

resources that were available were the Disability Law Center, which helps people with disabilities with their legal troubles, and Columbus Next Work, which provides and guides autistic individuals and their families through skills training to job placement. There were also booths like Kostopulos Dream Foundation, also known as Camp K, which provides opportunity for people with disabilities and special needs to gain access and enjoy their community.

he Salt Lake Community College Library provides a variety of services in order to help students succeed here at SLCC. From the online library to the on-campus libraries, the resources can help you with many things, from academics to the internet. One service they offer students is training and support for your ePortfolio. The staff at the resource desk can take drop-ins or you can make an appointment to help get that ePortfolio up to par. They also offer help utilizing their database in order to find the scholarly resources your papers require. These services alone make writing a research paper or perfecting your ePortfolio both easier and more manageable.

The SLCC Library also allows students to check out free Wi-Fi hotspots if they do not have Internet access at home. These hotspots allow students the comfort of doing research, homework, accessing canvas, or just surfing the

web from the comfort of their home. A hotspot device allows you to connect multiple devices to the Internet. This includes smartphones, laptops, and tablets. The hotspot is mobile so you can connect to the Internet from just about anywhere you want to go. To gain access to a hotspot, you will need to go to the Redwood Markosian Library at the Taylorsville campus and check one out from the Reference Desk. A SLCC One Card is required if you want to check one out. Once you have a hotspot, you can keep it for 28 days before having to return it or recheck it out, assuming there is availability. The Reference Desk stated that there is a short waitlist for hotspots at this time.
