Controversial commentator Mara Liasson speaks at SLCC **Aaron Martinez**

Salt Lake Community College hosted its Tanner Forum on Social Ethics with Mara Liasson on November 8 at SLCC's South City Campus in the Grand Theatre.

Mara Liasson is a national political correspondent for National Public Radio (NPR). She can be heard on All Things Considered, Morning Edition, and is a contributor at Fox News Channel. Liasson will be investigating how people currently consume news as well as the concept of the freedom of the press, and the recent successes and failures of the media.

Kailey, a student majoring in communication, stated, "I am excited to attend the forum. I am interested in NPR and talk radio, so I

would like to hear more of her experience in that,"

SLCC student, Ali Brown, was also interested in seeing Liasson speak.

"I listen to NPR everyday and won't be disappointed in learning more about the topic Mara Liasson will be presenting," says Brown.

While a majority of the sample of students surveyed said they were attending, one student, Maison Evensen, says he did not attend the Tanner Forum on Social Ethics.

Evensen did think this would be a great discussion to attend, but just wasn't able to go due to his work schedule.

The event provided an opportunity for students, staff, faculty and the community to gather for thoughtful examination of critical issues in contemporary social ethics. Other topics discussed were determining what is "fake" news versus accurate news, and where to locate appropriate sources of news besides on social media.

The Great American Smoke Out is an educational gathering that gives facts and information to students about smoking, as well as helping to make Salt Lake Community College a smoke-free campus.

The Great American Smoke Out took place Thursday, November 9 at the Taylorsville Redwood Campus, with the purpose of encouraging students to quit smoking not just cigarettes, but e-cigarettes as well. The goal was not to look down upon smokers or tobacco users, but to educate them on the health risks associated with smoking. There were tables of information along with healthcare providers, not only to give facts, but to aid anyone who wanted to quit and make healthier choices.

"I don't smoke but have a few friends who do," says Tonya, a student checking out the displays. "If I can give them some tips for quitting, maybe it will help them."

The event was put on by the SLCC Student Association and the Center for Health and Counseling, with the primary goal of making SLCC a tobacco-free campus. The organizers felt that this goal would benefit all students, ensure there is less second-hand smoke around campuses, and cigarette butts less to clean up as well. SLCCSA stressed they want all students to be aware of the dangers of tobacco use and be the healthiest they can be.





Altitude adjustment: out-of-state students at SLCC

Moving can be stressful, but also exciting. According to melissadata.com, almost eight million Americans move to a new state each year and people between the ages of 18-34 make up the majority of that number.

Salt Lake City is becoming a more popular place for young people to move. In addition to being the headquarters for the LDS Church, Utah boasts five National Parks, views of gorgeous mountains from pretty much anywhere, and a booming tech industry. Add all these factors together, and Utah is slowly becoming the fastest growing state. There are many nuances when moving to a new town, especially Salt Lake. It can take time to find your way around the grid system of the Salt Lake City streets, which Utah natives seems to find so easy. For example, 3rd means 300 and 11th means 1100.

"The hardest part about moving to SLC is learning the layout of the city and adjusting to the grid system. I speak English although, with my east coast accent it's hard for people to understand," says Salt Lake Community College student, Tonye Bob-Manuel.

Bob-Manuel moved here in 2014 from Rhode Island, where he had lived his entire life. His plan was to attend school at the University of Utah, but came to SLCC when he found out about the film program.

95% of SLCC's student body is made up of Utah residents, and though it only takes a year to become a resident, that can seem like a long time when paying out-of-state tuition.

Bob-Manuel said that he misses the mixture of people and culture back on the east coast, as does SLCC student, Alexis Ahlzadeh, who moved from Atlanta in 2015, where she had spent her entire life up until that point.

"The second I land back in Atlanta, I remember all the other groups of people that just don't exist in Salt Lake," says Ahlzadeh.

The adjustments of moving to a new town can be made easier by knowing someone in the area.

"A couple of friends from work here really helped me adjust," says Bob-Manuel.

"I met a girl who grew up in Atlanta right near me, and now we are really good friends. She helped me register at SLCC and now is helping me register at the U. She also taught me how to ski," says Ahlzadeh. "I miss my family. I visit home at least a few times a year and always on holidays."

The weather can be a shock to Utah newcomers. Winters are bitter cold with a lot of snow, while the summers can be uncomfortably hot.

"The hardest part was adjusting to the cold. I was freezing the first winter I spent out here and was not prepared with the right boots

or jackets at all. I spent all winter with wet feet. It was miserable," says Ahlzadeh. "I love the winters now, surprisingly."

Some from out-of-state say they plan to move after being in Salt Lake for a little bit.

"I graduate next year and if I find a job here, maybe I'd stay a few years, but the most would be 5 years," Bob-Manuel.

Newcomers waiting to become a resident should take advantage of the opportunity to explore the new terrain and try new things.

"Salt Lake is the most beautiful place I've ever lived and I love it! I wouldn't want to live anywhere else." says Alzadeh. "I love that I can drive 20 minutes in any direction and hit the mountains. My life is full of hiking, rock climbing, skiing, and camping - it's awesome."
