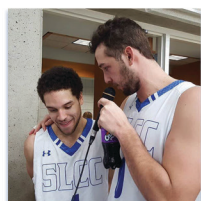

The Department of Family and Human Studies at Salt Lake Community College, along with The Utah Marriage Commission, have teamed up to introduce the Passport to Love.

At SLCC, there are many married and engaged couples who are working hard toward their degrees. They study and attend classes leaving little time to spend with their significant other. Paying for school also leaves them on a tight budget.

It can be difficult to balance a love life while attending school, the Department of Family and Human Studies at SLCC is offering a free five-week workshop to help.

"This is a great idea, it's hard to come up with things to do that don't cost money when you're broke all the time," says SLCC student, Michell Bristoll, who is engaged to be married this Spring.

The Passport to Love is a workshop for students who are married or engaged that teaches how to strengthen their relationships. It follows the PREP curriculum (Prevention and Relationship Enhancement program) and is designed to build commitment, intimacy and connection. It is done using a date night environment filled with fun activities and refreshments.

"School has definitely taken a toll on my marriage, and this program would help. My wife would love it and I would score major brownie points," says Jerald, an SLCC student who has been married for two years.

The Passport to Love is currently on Friday until March 16, 2018. Participants who complete the course receive a \$40 Amazon gift card and a \$20 gift card for referring another couple. There is limited space available and newlyweds and those about to be married take priority. If the event is "sold-out" there are other resources and future seminars available. # BRUIN BASEBALL IS LIVING A CHAMPIONSHIP CULTURE INTO EXISTENCE

Waddoups is confident his “athletic” offense can produce but says their deep pitching staff is really something to be excited about. Sophomores Ben Weese and Parker Hall are the top returning starting pitchers. Weese earned a victory his last time on the mound, throwing five strong innings with nine strikeouts.

Out of the bullpen, closer Jesse Parker looks to shutdown opponents late in games to chalk up some “W’s” for the Bruins.

“[Parker] throws a lot of strikes and he’s really just deceptive. [He] has a sneaky fastball, I mean it’s tough to hit. We look at it like, if we can get a lead into those last two innings, give the ball to him and game over,” explains Waddoups.

Bruin Baseball’s 2018 season is off to a nice start, posting a 7-3 record through their first 10 games. Prairie Baseball Academy had a doubleheader date with the Bruins on Valentine’s Day, but got dumped 6-4 and 11-0.

Last season was another honorable performance for Bruin baseball under head coach DG Nelson. The Bruins posted a respectable 32-20 record, going 28-16 in conference play. However, they fell to the Coyotes of Southern Nevada on championship day of the Region 18 Tournament.

Replacing the productive bat of Mitch Berryhill (Cal-State Fullerton) at the top of the order was an offseason obstacle to overcome. Sophomores Nick Seginowich and Quinn Ayers look to produce on a regular basis and build on their stellar freshman seasons.

Seginowich, the team’s starting catcher, bats in the No. 3 spot and already has three homeruns to start the year.

“[Seginowich] is probably our top returner. He was an all-region catcher as a freshman. You almost expect those guys to step up and lead you,” says longtime assistant coach Derek Waddoups.

The Bruins have some talented freshman this season as well. Waddoups expects starting LF Damian Henderson to make an immediate impact.

“[Henderson] hits in the four-hole. He’s gotten off to a really good start. He has big upside. He’s a really good athlete. [He has] plus barrel speed, is showing power but is also showing the ability to hit for a high batting average.”

Another freshman player is catching Waddoups’ attention as well.

“Jackson Otis, our starting SS and our leadoff hitter as well. His skillset projects really well. He’s really fast, runs a 6.5 [second] 60 [yard-dash]. As a leadoff hitter, he’s that high on-base percentage guy. He has the unique ability to hit for power too, but is really suited as a leadoff, speed-style player.”

The players participate in team-building activities such as during the offseason, the Know Greater Heroes (KGH) program. KGH is where all SLCC freshmen student athletes come together for the community and its youth. The programs involved are baseball, softball, volleyball, soccer and basketball.

“We teach them a leadership course in the fall, a 12-week sports psychology leadership course. Then, we start doing elementary school assemblies so they have the opportunity to get out into the elementary schools in the valley. We do about 30 elementary school assemblies every year.”

Waddoups also credited the classroom and the weight room as places his players learn to work together to become better teammates on the field.

“We always tell our guys when we recruit them the place we’re going to push them hardest is, number one in the classroom. Because, you have to be a great student to be on the field. The second place is the weight room. They need to take care of their bodies to be an elite athlete. The more you work and sweat together and get after it in the weight room and the classroom and support each other on and off the field, the more you build your team.”

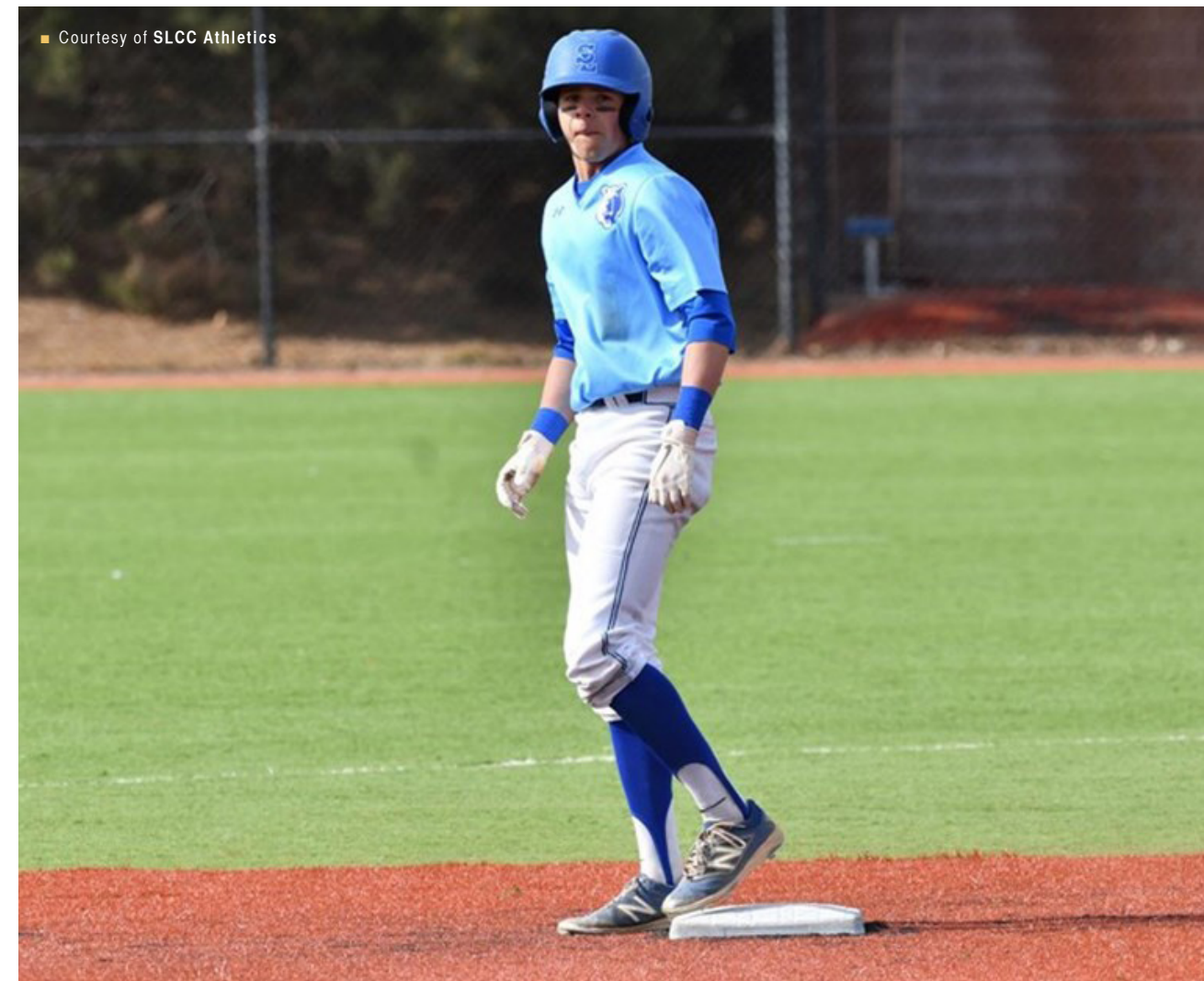
The expectation for this year’s team is to be champions. Their ultimate goal is to get to Grand Junction to play in the 2018 JUCO World Series. To get there, the Bruins must win the Region 18 end-of-season tournament and then win the district tournament.

In Waddoups’ 10 years as an assistant coach the Bruins have made the district tournament three times but have not been able to advance to the national tournament yet. He believes creating a championship culture is the key to advancing through the various tournaments.

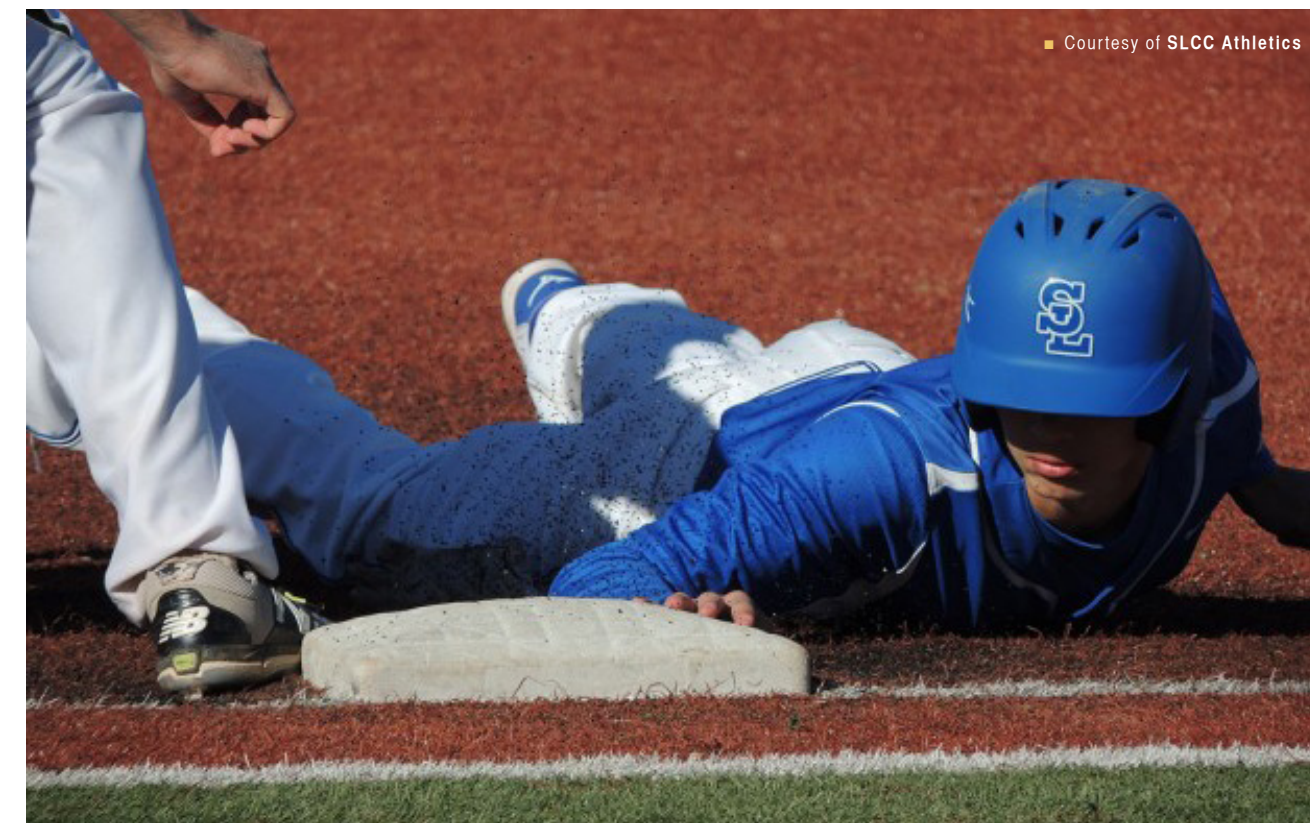
“The biggest expectation for our team is to be champions. We talk about that in every phase of life; be a champion off the field and how you treat people, be a champion in the classroom, be a champion in everything you do. The more you create that championship culture is how you become champions on the field.”

The baseball team heads to Henderson, NV for a SWAC tournament that begins on Feb. 22. Region play begins March 2. The Bruins next play at home on Friday, March 9 at 1 p.m. as they take on Utah State University Eastern for a 3-game series at Cate Field (West Jordan, UT).

# Classic film showings help students appreciate art form

Of all the newspapers, in all the colleges, in all of countries, you picked this one up.

And of all the films made during the Golden Age of Hollywood, Salt Lake Community College is hosting four films from the 1940's in the screening room at South City Campus. The four films being screened are "Casablanca" (1942), "The Red Shoes" (1948), "Shadow of a Doubt" (1943), and "Rebecca" (1940).

Admission to the screenings is free to the public, and discussions about the films take place before and after the screening. The screenings take place at the Center for Arts and Media at SLCC's South City campus' Screening Room (1-106A).

The purpose of screening these films for the public at SLCC is to help provide a place for people who want to study great films from the past, according to adjunct professor Stephen Williams.

"It's just like if you were a painter, you would want to study Michelangelo, and Van Gogh, and Picasso. And these are, the films that we're showing, are the greatest films ever made. So it's really instruction as well as entertainment," said Williams.

Williams was given the freedom to select the four films being screened. He compiled a list of 20 films from the 1940's and selected these four because of their emotional connection to the audience through the power of their tremendous writing. Williams admitted that the writing isn't the biggest reason, but it's significant to consider.

"Hitchcock said 'there are three things you need for a great movie: the script, the script, and the script,'" expressed Williams. "These films are unabashedly emotional, they are non-cynical like the most the films today are."

Students are encouraged to go and see the films and participate in the discussions to learn about what makes these timeless films classics. Williams wants people to learn what makes great movies stand the test of time.

"We see a lot of films these days and some are very good but most are not," lamented Williams. "They're very often made to be like video games that people watch. And so people don't know what a good film is. So I'm hoping a first time viewer, somebody seeing a classic film for the first time as in my classes will go 'Oh okay, I get what all the fuss is'. What makes a film great versus what makes a film good."

The first film in the series to screen was "Casablanca", on February 20th. "Casablanca" is a love story with a war-film background. The film stars Humphrey Bogart as the rugged but kind-hearted nightclub owner Rick Blaine, Ingrid Bergman as Ilsa Lund, a woman with a complicated history between herself and Rick, and Paul Henreid as the brash and patriotic Holocaust survivor.

The film itself is widely considered one of the greatest films of all time. It brings a unique sense of humor and the romance in the film is so stunning and poignant, you feel like you might need a cigarette after watching it.

This film was made in 1942 when people weren't allowed to kiss on screen, so finding a way to express love and affection using just looks and words could be a strange concept to people unfamiliar with the change in film over the past several decades. All of the characters in the film are so unique and vivid, you immediately find yourself drawn in to the plot.

The next screenings are "The Red Shoes" on March 6th, "Shadow of a Doubt" on March 27th, and "Rebecca" on April 3rd. Visit [globeslcc.com/calendar](http://globeslcc.com/calendar) for more information.

"These films really go for the heart, that's the thing I like the most about them," said Williams, "The non-cynical, the purity, of them."
